## U.S. CENSUS "URBAN AREA" STATUS CHANGES IN SOME NEGRC COMMUNITIES

On December 29, 2022, the United States Census announced they had changed the criteria for qualifying urban areas. Previously, under the old criteria, urbanized areas needed at least 50,000 people, and urban clusters had a threshold of at least 2,500 people. Under the new criteria, the threshold to be considered an urban area is a minimum population of 5,000 or at least 2,000 housing units. Also, the distinction between an urbanized area and an urban cluster has been eliminated. The US Census has released the updated list of urban areas based on the new criteria and the 2020 decennial data. NEGRC urban areas and areas that lost urban status are listed in the table below:

The US Census now primarily uses housing-unit density over population density when delineating urban areas. There are now noncontiguous urban areas as the census no longer includes low-density hop-and-jump corridor blocks in urban areas. Boundaries of urban areas are also being drawn considering Longitudinal Employer-Household Dynamics Origin-Destination Employment Statistics (LODES) commuting data.

The new urban area boundaries can be viewed via the **TIGERweb** application. In addition, TIGER/Line Shapefiles and Geodatabases of the new urban area boundaries will be available for download by the end of the month.

## CITY OF COVINGTON AND CITY OF OXFORD UPDATE COMPREHENSIVE PLANS

The City of Covington and the City of Oxford recently received approval from the Georgia Department of Community Affairs regarding the five-year update of their local comprehensive plans. The two communities share a boundary but are very distinct in character. The NEGRC's Planning & Government Services Division (PGS), assisted both communities with their comprehensive-plan updates. In total, input from over 200 people and various local government departments was compiled to determine needs and opportunities and a vision that will guide growth in the years to come.

A comprehensive plan is a locally adopted document that serves as a long-term guide to growth and development for the local government to use and implement. The Georgia Planning Act requires the document (O.C.G.A. 45-12-200, et seq., and 50-8-1, et seq.) for all local governments and must be updated every five (5) years. The AAA is responsible for planning and administering aging and disability services offered in the Northeast Georgia Planning Service Area.

The AAA holds public hearings to inform and educate the community on services offered through the AAA and to get input from the community to ensure the services offered meet the community's needs.

There were 103 persons in attendance at the public hearing. Anyone unable to attend the Public Hearing was provided input on Aging Services by completing a Needs Assessment survey published in each of the 12 county newspapers or online at **www.negrc.org**.
